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Subbase Centennial Celebration

Southeastern Connecticut is celebrating 100 years as the "Submarine Capital" of the world and Ledyard Libraries along with other area libraries and businesses are joining in.



As Daniel Malloy stated in his letter to the Secretary of the Navy requesting support for a yearlong celebration – the submarine base first began as a Navy Yard in 1868. That changed on October 18, 1915 when the first submarines began to arrive. On June 21, 1916 the Navy Yard became the Submarine Base with a newly established Submarine School and the New London Submarine Flotilla under the command of Yeates Stirling.

A committee of volunteers from area towns has been established and programs, events and activities have been planned throughout the year. Two programs have been scheduled at Bill Library with the Commander of the Submarine Base, Captain Paul Whitescarver and the Education Specialist at the Submarine Force Museum. See inside for details. Additional programs including a History of the Dive Tower with Jim Streeter, a panel discussion on Surviving BRAC, They also Served: Submarine Spouses Then and Now, with Kathleen O'Beirne, and the Future of Submarine Service with Captain Whitescarver have been planned. April: Circling the Sun by Paula McLain.



It's been 30 years since the wonderful Oscar-winning film Out of Africa roared onto movie screens, starring a luminous Meryl Streep as memoirist Karen Blixen (pen name Isak Dinesen) and a rugged Robert Redford as her romantic prey, big-

game hunter Denys Finch Hatton. It turns out there was a third party to their 1920s love affair -- aviator Beryl Markham, who was just as mad about the elusive Finch Hatton as was her unhappily married friend Blixen. Who knew? Now Markham gets her moment in the sun, starring in Paula McLain's latest work of historical fiction.

May: The Soul of an Octopus by Sy Montgomery



Renowned author Sy Montgomery's latest gem is a must read for those who want to dissolve the human-constructed borders between "them" (other animals) and us. Surely, there are large differences among nonhuman animals and between nonhuman and human animals, but there

also are many basic similarities. Connecting with other animals is part of the essential and personal process of rewilding and reconnecting with other animals, and The Soul of an Octopus is just what is needed to close the gap. (Marc Bekoff, author of The Emotional lives of Animals)

June: Outline by Rachel Cusk In the most seemingly effortless way imaginable, [this novel] winds up being completely captivating: the conversations are autobiographies in miniature, with all the



holes, lies and self-deceptions lurking in that wily form . . . Cusk's own writing is a pleasure to read -- unfailingly precise and surprising . . . it nudges you into being a more attentive reader and listener, more alert to the cracks in sentences and the messier realities that words can only try to contain. History of the Submarine Base Tuesday, April 22 Bill Library

Please join us as we celebrate Connecticut's Submarine Century with a look back at the history of the submarine base. Eury Cantillo, Museum Education Specialist at the

Submarine Force Museum, has combed the Museum's collection to create a photographic journey through history. The tour will include aerial photos through the decades, pictures of President Franklin Roosevelt's visit in 1940, early historic views of the base including the evolution of the waterfront and memories from each era from WWI through the Cold War.

The Automobile Industry of Southeastern Connecticut (and SW Rhode Island) Tuesday, April 26 7:00 pm Bill Library

For much of the twentieth century the American motor industry was concentrated in southern Michigan, so much so that it became synonymous with the region's major city: "Detroit." In the early days of the motor car, however, the industry was more like the 1990's dot-coms: hundreds of small companies throughout the country - start-ups, instant successes and failures.

Connecticut, in fact, was a major hub prior to 1910, with Pope and Columbia in Hartford, Corbin in New Britain and Locomobile in Bridgeport. Our region had its share of car companies, too, and their



stories are fascinating, even bizarre. Historian Kit Foster will tell the tales of New London's Cameron car, the AMS Sterling of Amston and the enigmatic Cycleplane built in Westerly.

Kit Foster is a past president of the Society of Automotive Historians and is currently Ledyard's Town Historian. The event is free and open to the public.

Once the major settlement in the Town of Ledyard, Gales Ferry developed in the eighteenth century because of its proximity to the Thames estuary, and later gained importance with the coming of the railroad at the turn of the twentieth century. Join Town Historian Kit Foster on a walk through Gales Ferry Village, learning about the settlement of the area, its residents, the homes in which they lived and the commerce and agriculture that comprised their livelihoods. - **deliverIT CT** replaces Connecticar (Ccar) the statewide delivery service that transports books from one library to another.
- **borrowIT CT** replaces Connecticard (CCard) the service that allows patrons to use their hometown library card in any public library in the state.
- **researchIT CT** replaces iCONN the online databases provided to all Connecticut residents.
- **findIT CT** replaces reQuest Connecticut's statewide library catalog.
- **requestIT CT** replaces reQuest ILL the service that offers to locate and borrow books not available from our library or LION for you.
