




# **Downton Abbey Tea**

## **December Book Title:**



# An echo through the snow by Andrea Thalasinos

This debut novel is an inspiring story of how a single act of kindness can transform your life. Rosalie MacKenzie is headed nowhere until she sees Smokey, a Siberian

husky suffering from neglect. Rosalie finds the courage to rescue the dog, and—united by the bond of love that forms between them—they save each other. Soon Rosalie and Smokey are immersed in the world of competitive dogsled racing. Days are filled with training runs, the stark beauty of rural Wisconsin, and the whoosh of runners on snow. Alternating between past and present, telling of a struggling Chukchi family and a young woman discovering herself, *An Echo Through the Snow* takes readers on a gripping, profound, and uplifting dogsled ride to the Iditarod and beyond, on a journey of survival and healing.

# January Book Title: Submergence by J.M. Ledgard

A story featuring glamorous James More, an English spy and descendant of Sir Thomas More, and Danielle "Danny" Flinders, of Martinique and Australia, a sexy oceanographer and biomathematician. They meet and fall in love at a small, charming European



hotel just before Christmas. As the tale begins, More is a prisoner of jihadists in Somalia, while Flinders is on a scientific mission on the Greenland Sea, exploring deep-sea vents. At times silly, and at others brutal, beautiful, and extraordinary! (*Booklist.*)

# February Book Title: Someone by Alice McDermott

In this deceptively simple tour de force, McDermott lays bare the keenly observed life of Marie Commeford, an ordinary woman whose compromised eyesight makes her both figuratively and literally unable to see the world for what it is. We follow Marie through the milestones of her life, shadowed by her elder brother, Gabe, who mysteriously leaves the priesthood for which everyone thought he was destined. The story of Marie's life unfolds in a nonlinear fashion:

McDermott describes the loss of Marie's father, her first experience with intimacy, her first job (in a funeral parlor of all places), her marriage, the birth of a child. (*Publisher's Weekly*.)

#### **March Book Title:**

# **Book of Ages: The Life and Opinions of Jane Franklin by Jill Lepore**

Benjamin Franklin and his youngest sister, Jane, were so close they were called Benny and Jenny. Renowned, world-traveling brother and obscure, homebound sister exchanged loving, newsy, bantering letters for more than 60 years. Most of his were preserved, while three decades' worth of hers disappeared. This near-erasure, along with the gender bias that determined the vast differences in the siblings' education, opportunities, and experiences, become as much a focus in this zestfully rigorous portrait as Jane herself. (*Booklist.*)

# The Author Next Door – Douglas Thompson The Quest for the Golden Trout Wednesday, January 22 7:00 pm Bill Library

Join us to hear Ledyard author, Douglas Thompson, discuss his book which looks at our nation's rivers with a more critical eye—and asks more questions about both historic and current practices in fisheries management. He looks at the damaging effects of stocking rivers with hatchery-raised trout, eliminating natural predators, and employing engineered devices designed to improve on nature. These practices not only hurt the ecosystem, they also create a false environment that's antithetical to a pristine, pastoral pastime. Mr. Thompson is a professor of geology at Connecticut College and the Karla Heurich Harrison '28 Director of the Goodwin-Niering Center for the Environment. 



# **Consumer Reports Online**



Access to *Consumer Reports* has changed this year with the full text version available

through the iConn suite of databases. Clicking the link on the libraries' web page brings you to the iConn page where you are asked to log in with your library card number. Once you are in a list of popular magazines will show. Clicking the link for *Consumer Reports* brings you to the record for the magazine. Click the link at the top left side of the page that says "Search within this Publication." This brings you to a search box that says JN "Consumer Reports." Add the topic you wish to search in the box (i.e. JN "Consumer Reports" and Digital cameras) and select search. This brings up a list of articles published in CR on that



topic. For each one there is an option to see the full text of the article. Click the "PDF Full Text" link to



reviews cars, click on the year to the right that would include the most recent issue for the month you are looking for. Clicking on that issue brings up each article within. You will also find a copy of the annual buying guide under each year. Call either library if you have any questions.

Ledyard Libraries and Libraries Online (LION) are now offering a large selection of downloadable magazines via Zinio, the world's

largest newsstand, offering full color, interactive digital magazines for your enjoyment. Browse from a collection of popular titles with no holds, no checkout periods, no fines, and no limit to the number of issues you can download. New issues are released simultaneously with the print edition and many are available for download before they arrive here. Using the personal account you will create, you will have the opportunity to check out the magazines you choose and read them instantly on your computer (both PC and Mac) or access the content on a portable media device. (Note: Viewing options, including the ability to download or view the content while online, may differ based on the device and/or magazine publisher.)

Check out as many issues as you want and keep them in your account as long as you wish.
