January

Gutenberg's Apprentice: a novel by Alix Christie

Youthful, ambitious Peter Schoeffer is on the verge of professional success as a scribe in Paris when his foster father, the wealthy merchant and bookseller Johann Fust, summons him home to corruptionriddled, feud-plagued Mainz to meet "a most amazing man." Johann Gutenberg, a driven and caustic inventor, has devised a revolutionary—and, to some, blasphemous—method of bookmaking: a machine he calls a printing press. Fust is financing Gutenberg's workshop, and he orders Peter to become Gutenberg's apprentice. (Publisher.)

February

The Wallcreeper by Nell Zink -

This short, quirky, first novel tells the story of Tiffany. Tiffany's voice and take on life (or attempt to find a take on life) are the core attraction of the story. A humanities major who cannot find an appropriate job, her marriage to an engineer and their move to Switzerland where the language barrier keeps her from finding a job are features of her story.

March

Hild: a novel by Nicola Griffith

Griffith explores the young life of Hild, the future St. Hilda of Whitby. Set in seventh-century Anglo-Saxon England, during the early years of Christianity, this novel begins with the sudden death of Hild's father, Lord Hereric. To secure the futures of her daughters, Hild's ruthless and cunning mother embarks on a plan to hook their fate to the coattails of Edwin Snakebeard, Lord Hereric's ambitious brother and king-to-be. A beautifully written, and meticulously researched novel. (Booklist starred review.)

Actress Presents Life of Elizabeth Keckly

Actress Stephanie Jackson will perform her dramatic presentation "They Called Me Lizzy...from Slavery to the White House." Jackson's one-woman show portrays Elizabeth Keckly, best known as dressmaker and

confidante to Mary Todd Lincoln, wife of President Abraham Lincoln. Her program covers Keckly's rise from slavery to entrepreneurial freedom. Born into slavery in 1818, she eventually purchased her freedom and made her way to Washington D.C. where her dressmaking and business skills brought her to the attention of many political families including the Lincoln's. Mrs. Keckly authored a book "Thirty Years a Slave and Four Years in the White House" which precipitated the severing of her relationship with Mrs. Lincoln. Although not formally educated she went on to become the head of Wilberforce University's Department of Domestic Arts and Sciences at Xenia, Ohio. The program, sponsored by the Friends of the Ledyard Libraries, the Ledyard Historical Society and the Ledyard Senior Commission, is free and open to the public.



Ledyard Dam and Reservoir Hike

Karl Acimovic with Groton Utilities will guide our 4.4 mile moderately difficult hike today. Copies of site maps will be available. Located on the east side of the reservoir, this trail features old farms, a cemetery, and based on snow conditions, we may see signs of native wildlife. This privately managed site offers many treasures not accessible without our special access. Park at GU Gate #42 on Gales Ferry Rd., cones will mark entrance. Tailgate refreshments will cap off our hike, courtesy of the Friends of Ledyard Libraries.

Avery Farm Preserve Hike

This 305 acre wildlife site is owned by GOSA, Groton Open Space Association, <u>www.gosaonline.org</u>. Marshes, grassy fields, hedgerows, Haley Brook wetlands,



vernal pools, and many more natural highlights will be seen on this early spring hike. This is considered to be an easy to moderately difficult hike. Access the site from Rte. 184 to the end of Lambtown Rd., Groton. Picnic tables are available for our after hike refreshments provided by the Friends of Ledyard Libraries.

What in the world is a Fish Ladder! Tuesday, March 24

If you imagine a fish flapping its way up the rungs of a step ladder to reach its goal you are, strange as it may seem, on the right track. And Ledyard residents

have one right next door in Preston. Historically, alewife journeyed from their native estuarine habitat in Long Island Sound, to the Thames River, and from there a system of waterways to spawn in Avery Pond. But dam construction hindered the journey, reducing alewife populations nationwide. Alewife are a critical species, serving as prey for larger fish, birds and mammals. After spawning, alewife return to the sound and ultimately help support larger populations of other species, including game fish that are a large part of the \$8.5 billion Long Island Sound economy. Dan Mullins, Executive Director of the Eastern CT Conservation District will discuss the two year old Hallville Fishway and share details of the construction of inclines, a resting tank, and a viewing room with an underwater camera that was nine years in the making. Previously alewife was prevented from moving from Poquetanuck Brook to the pond because of the 15 foot high Hallville Dam. Now they, along with other species such as pickerel and eel, are able to make their way to higher waters. The Hallville Dam was the first and largest of three barriers to migratory fish in this watershed. Sponsored by the Friends of the Ledyard Libraries, this program is free and open to the public.
