

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Ledyard Libraries Migrate to Millennium

Ledyard Public Libraries is pleased to announce their move to a new library automation system along with the 20 other libraries in the LION consortium. The new system is called Millennium and is a product of Innovative Interfaces, Inc. The



Millennium system will replace the current Online Catalog and the circulation, cataloging and acquisitions functions. Library users who access library services via the Internet will see improved services for managing their accounts, viewing community information and searching the online catalog.

The library staff is busy preparing for the new system which is expected to be operational in late September. The current system contains the holdings of 21 public, school and academic libraries. As with any system migration, some of the information must be restructured and some must be corrected before it can be loaded into the new system. This work was done over the summer.

The Ledyard Libraries wish to assure their users that any disruption in services as a result of the migration will be kept to a minimum. Library staff attended Millennium training sessions during the summer so that they will be able to assist library users with learning about the new functions. Library users are invited to inquire at Bill or Gales Ferry Library about the availability of the new system and the ways that it will affect them.

Summer Wrap up



We had a great time with all sorts of animals in "Paws, Claws, Scales and Tales" this summer. There were 257 players in the older program (grades 2-6) and

104 players in the Read to Me program (ages 4 – grade 1) for a total of 361 children who participated at both Bill and Gales Ferry Libraries. The older

children read 253,795 minutes and the younger children read 3,490 books! A contest was held over the summer for each of the elementary schools. Whichever person read the most minutes in each school, will get to paint Mrs. Brewer's face into whatever animal they choose! We will announce the winners in the next newsletter. In addition to the reading programs, we had a Travel Game, Ledyard/Gales Ferry Scavenger Hunt, Sidewalk Chalk Contest, Preschool Story time, Guiding Eyes for the Blind, Paws to Read, Lunch and a Movie, Cedar Island Marina, Curious Creatures, and Wind Over Wings for our finale.

Creature Feature Teen Summer Reading 2006

We had a lot of fun this summer with the teens!

Our theme begged for classic horror movies, so we joined with the children & adult programs and produced Wednesdays as Movie Day at the Bill Library. In addition we had a great yoga class, and ran a pet show for the

The teens were terrific this summer, helping the staff handle the increased business here at the libraries! It is such a convenience to have them running the game for the younger children, helping the staff and making much shorter waiting times for families.

Our final program, the Teen Ice Cream Social, happened Friday, September 15th at the Gales Ferry



library. Participants enjoyed sundaes received awards, and brainstormed about next year's program. The top three students who read the most books or volunteered the most hours during the program were awarded prizes.

In addition, Certificates were presented to those who volunteered for the summer program and the Teen Friends of the Library. If you were unable to be at the Ice Cream Social your certificates are waiting to be picked up at the library.

The most books read numbers were: 1st-46 books, 2nd-43 books and 3rd-38 books. Honorable mention goes to 2 other students for 32 and 25 books each. For the most volunteer hours there were: 1st-50 hours, 2nd-42 hours and 3rd-40 hours. Honorable mention also goes to 3 more students for 22 hours, and 2 who were tied for 20 hours each.

October 18, 2006: Billy Boyle: A World War II

Mystery by James Benn. (Author Visit and Book Signing) As a previous director of Bill Library, we welcome Jim back again to talk with us about his new book just released in September. We will have the book available for sale and Jim has agreed to sign copies! Come hear a terrific author talk about what drives him to write and to hear the latest on his character Billy Boyle!

November 15, 2006: Black Swan Green by David Mitchell. Thirteen chapters provide monthly snapshots of Jason Taylor's life in small-town England from January 1982 to January 1983. Whether the 13-year-old narrator is battling his stammer or trying to navigate the social hierarchy of his schoolmates or watching the slow disintegration of his parents' marriage, he relates his story in a voice that is achingly true to life. The author does not pull any punches when it comes to the casual cruelty that adolescent boys can inflict on one another, but it is this very brutality that underscores the sweetness of which they are also capable.

Reference Service Now Available Even When the Libraries are Closed



It's 2 A.M. Do you know where your librarian is? She is

waiting to hear from you. InfoAnytime is a real-time, web-based reference service that features professional librarians who can help you find the information you need when our two libraries are closed for the night. From www.infoanytime.org, or the link on our homepage, connect to a reference librarian who will help you to navigate through the increasingly complex world of web-based research any time of day.

InfoAnytime was piloted in Connecticut in 2005-2006, and now serves 130 public and 30 academic libraries throughout the state. Similar services providing 24/7 research assistance have been offered in other states, including Colorado, New Jersey, and Wisconsin. All online librarians are hired and trained by New York based Tutor.com and hold an MLS, MLIS or an equivalent degree.

This service can be accessed through any computer in the participating libraries or from home,

school or office using your library bar code number. The online librarian will use chat functions, cobrowsing of web pages and electronic databases, (including iconn.org, the suite of research databases provided to Connecticut residents free of charge by the Connecticut State Library.) At the end of each session, a transcript of the session can be emailed to the user. No downloads or special software are required. Anyone with internet access can use this service with their library card.

Please try this new service when we are unavailable and let us know how you like having after-hours help searching for information.

Shelving Grants Received

Bill Library will be receiving some much needed media shelving thanks to Ledyard Library Friends and matching grants from Dime Bank Foundation and Liberty Bank Foundation. A nine-foot range of double-sided shelving will have drawer-like bins that pull out to hold the music CD collection and some of the audio book collection. The new shelving will alleviate the overcrowding in that area and provide easier access to the collections.

Rotary Grant Received

The Ledyard Rotary Club awarded Bill Library a grant to purchase an Online Public Access Computer table. The space in front of the reference desk will be reconfigured for new shelving and the card catalog which currently holds the two online Public Access Computers will be removed. The Rotary grant will fund a table for one of the computers.
