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## The Changing Face of Your Library

Ledyard Libraries strive to meet the changing needs of our patrons as demands have required. Books and other media, while still an important part of our service are not the only things we offer. From technology to a community meeting place your library has evolved to be more than just a warehouse for books.

Technology has made it possible to provide information 24/7 remotely even when the library is closed. From the library's website it is possible to download an e-book, an audio book or the current issue of your favorite magazine. Online resources available through ICONN, answer your questions about science, health, history and more. Find information on car repair, take a practice SAT test or check the price of that vase your grandmother owned. Take advantage of public computers in the library or use the Wifi for your own device. Attend one of our sessions on using your e-reader or tablet or how to set up a social media account. Staff will also provide one on one training if you can't make a class.

Programs provide information and/or entertainment whether it is a 3-D printer demonstration, understanding probate or musical entertainment. Collaboration with other groups helps stretch limited dollars and brings in high quality programs. The Senior Center, the Historical Society, the Garden Club and the Southeastern CT Regional Probate Court are some of the groups we have collaborated with.

Your library provides a community meeting space where you can meet your friends and neighbors. Enjoy a cup of coffee and a muffin while you catch up on the news. With the nice weather coming we will soon have an outdoor space for you to enjoy. Many of you spend 3-4 hours a day working in the library and we want your stay to be comfortable.

### **April Book Title:**

### The Rosie Project by Graeme C. Simsion

Full of heart and humor, Simsion's debut novel about a fussy, socially-challenged man's search for the perfect wife is smart, breezy, quirky, and fun. Sure, it's the precise equivalent of a well-crafted romantic comedy. But you'd have to be a pretty cynical reader not to fall for Don Tillman, a handsome genetics professor who has crafted a pathologically micromanaged life for himself but can't seem to score a second date. After launching his Wife Project, which includes a hilarious questionnaire intended to weed out imperfect candidates Don meets Rosie, a stunning, maddeningly disorganized bartender/student who's looking for her biological father. ### Queen's Gambit by Elizabeth Fremantle

Intrigue, romance, and treachery abound in Fremantle's debut novel as Katherine Parr, the sixth wife of Henry VIII, walks a fine line between passion and loyalty. Married to an aging king with a penchant for discarding wives, she must learn to navigate the often perilous intricacies, suspicions, and ambitions of a divided Tudor court. Though passionately in love with dashing courtier Thomas Seymour, Katherine shrewdly adapts to her new role, becoming a positive influence on Henry while arousing the ire of many of his advisors. # The Bookman's Tale: a novel of obsession By Charlie Lovett

Antiquarian bookseller Peter Byerly immerses himself in his trade to overcome grief from the loss of his beloved wife a few months earlier. Now plying his trade in England's Cotswolds instead of the North Carolina site of his tragedy, Byerly happens across a small watercolor portrait of a woman who looks startlingly like his late wife. And so begins an obsessive hunt to find out the origins of this painting. (Booklist.)

blacksmithing for the Williams-Mystic Maritime Studies Program, Introduction to Blacksmith Metallurgy Lab for the Coast Guard Academy at Mystic Seaport, adult classes, private lessons, and inschool hands-on programs.

Specializing in whaling tools, slave hardware, ships hardware and trade tools, he lends his expertise not only to the seaport but to other museums and movie and documentary productions, as well as teaching and demonstrating in a variety of venues. As busy as that keeps him he finds time to serve as president of the Connecticut Blacksmith Guild, as a director of the Lock Museum of America, and as a Boy Scout Metals Merit Badge Counselor. A retired Navy Master Chief, Bill has been at Mystic Seaport for 24 years.

### April is National Poetry Month.

Ledyard Libraries will celebrate this year with a focus on Haiku. Do You Haiku? A haiku is an unrhymed



three-line poem. It is based on a traditional Japanese poetic form. Though there are different ways to write haiku, the traditional pattern in English is to write the first and last lines with five syllables each, and the middle line with seven syllables. The pattern of syllables looks like this:

Line 1: 5 syllables (1 2 3 4 5) Line 2: 7 syllables (1 2 3 4 5 6 7) Line 3: 5 syllables (1 2 3 4 5) Most often, haiku poems are about seasons or nature, though you can write your own haiku about anything you like... The last line of a haiku usually makes an observation. That is, the third line points out something about the subject you are writing about. <a href="http://www.merriam-webster.com/dictionary/haiku">http://www.merriam-webster.com/dictionary/haiku</a>

Here is an example: **Tired cat sleeps all night. He needs lots of rest for a long day of napping**
