

Libraries have changed the world for many people including Gregory Maguire, screenwriter, Ernest and Julio Gallo, wine makers and locally, the Town of Ledyard Finance Director, Lyle Davieau. Gregory Maguire, the author of Wicked: the Life and Times of the Wicked Witch of the West which forms the basis of the award winning Broadway musical, "Wicked" spent many hours in a library. In 1933, Ernest and Julio Gallo turned to their local library when they needed a wine recipe to start their business. They found the pamphlet "Principles of Winemaking." They started to make wine, pursued their dream and the rest is history. For Lyle Davieau, libraries opened up a world of reading and books. As a young boy growing up there were few activites for children in the community where he lived. He found out his local library was sponsoring a summer reading program where he discovered reading could take him to new places.

Adult Programs

Book Discussions



Join our monthly book discussions on Wednesday evenings at Bill Library, beginning at 7 P.M. We always welcome new participants and provide evening refreshments.

April 19, 2006: The Shadow of the Wind by Carlos Ruiz Zafón. This story provokes such thoughts because it is a long novel that will remind readers of a good many other novels. This isn't meant as criticism but as an indication of the story's richness and architectonic intricacy.

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Before everything else, Carlos Ruiz Zafón's European bestseller is a book about a mysterious book, and its even more mysterious author. Try to imagine a blend of Grand Guignol thriller, historical fiction, occasional farce, existential mystery and passionate love story; then double it. If that's too hard to do, let me put it another way: If you love A.S. Byatt's Possession, García Márquez's One Hundred Years of Solitude, the short stories of Borges, Umberto Eco's The Name of the Rose, Arturo Pérez-Reverte's The Club Dumas or Paul Auster's "New York" trilogy, not to mention Victor Hugo's *Hunchback of Notre* Dame and William Hjortsberg's Falling Angel, then you will love The Shadow of the Wind. (From the Washington Post review.)

May 17, 2006 Food Revolution: How your diet can help save your life and our world by John Robbins. This book discussion will be led by Julia Cronin, co-owner of Cedar Meadow Farm in Ledyard. Come hear how her farm is run and how those methods are in keeping with the principles John Robbins has laid out in his newest title. Robbins (of the Baskin and Robbins Ice Cream Families) has written several books including this one about global warming, animal rights, meat safety, and genetically altered food. The Publisher's Weekly review says this book is likely to spark discussion and incite readers to examine their food choices.

June 21, 2006 *Midnight at the Dragon* Cafe by Judy Fong Bates. This first novel by a Chinese-Canadian author has just been given recognition as an ALA Notable book of 2006. Set in the 1960's this is a coming of age story of a young Chinese girl (Su-Jen/Annie) and her family struggling to adapt to life in a small Ontario town. As Su-Jen's father works continually for a better future, her mother. a beautiful but embittered woman, settles uneasily into their new life. Su-Jen feels the weight of her mother's unhappiness as Su-Jen's life takes her outside the restaurant and far from the customs of the traditional past. When Su-Jen's half-brother arrives, smoldering under the responsibilities he must bear as the dutiful Chinese son, he forms an alliance with Su-Jen's mother, one that will have devastating consequences. Written in spare, intimate prose, *Midnight at the Dragon Café* is a vivid portrait of a childhood divided by two cultures and touched by unfulfilled longings and unspoken secrets.

Saturday, March 25 Letterboxing Nathan Lester House Trails 1:00 p.m.

Scott Buka will lead us through the trails on the grounds of Nathan Lester House for a letterboxing hike. Letterboxing combines hiking with a treasure hunt and is a great way to enjoy a walk in



the woods! The object is to find the hidden box which contains a notebook with comments from previous hikers and a stamp. Rudimentary letterboxing kits will be available the day of the hike, or you are encouraged to assemble your own! All you need is a rubber stamp of your choice, (which some people carve from an art eraser), or a token, a stamp pad, a notebook and writing implement. Use the stamp in the box on your notebook and add your stamp or token with your comments to the notebook in the box. For more information about letterboxing, logon to www.letterboxing.org. Park in the lot on the entrance road to the Lester House, and meet at the front of the House.

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Saturday, April 22 Glacial Park Glacial History 1: 00 p.m.

Doug Thompson, a Geology professor at Connecticut College will lead hikers through Glacier Park and describe the glacial history of the area. The hike will begin at the Recessional Moraine site on Whalehead Road. Hikers will have the option of continuing to the Kettlehole trail on Avery Hill Extension. Ledyard has a Boulder train and several kettleholes left by the Wisconsin glacier 12,000 years ago. The "moraine consists of huge boulders tumbled 3 or 4 deep in places, and extending for several miles." Note: The main trail requires scrambling over rocks and boulders and may not be within the capability of all hikers. An alternate trail follows the edge of the boulder moraine with side trips in to view and explore the boulders.

The 2nd Annual Ledvard Sampler will take place at the Nathan Lester House. Activities will include tours of the Lester House and Tool Museum, self-guided hikes, and a refreshment stand. In



addition we will have craft demonstrations, such as blacksmithing, spinning, weaving, hearth cooking, pottery making, and butter churning. A delightful exhibit of live farm animals and the return of the alpacas will round out the displays. We are also looking for entertainers to provide historic-based entertainment on a voluntary basis, such as singers, storytellers, or musicians. Free spaces will be provided to non-profit & civic groups who aren't selling any items, but would like to publicize their causes, demonstrate an historic craft, or provide entertainment.
