#### **Book Discussions**

Join our monthly book discussions on Wednesday evenings at Bill Library, beginning at 7 P.M. We always welcome new participants and provide evening refreshments.

April 18, 2007: Last Child in the Woods: Saving Our Children from Nature- Deficit Disorder by Richard Louv. Today's kids are increasingly disconnected from the natural world, says child advocacy expert Richard Louv, even as research shows that "thoughtful exposure of youngsters to nature can... be a powerful form of therapy for attention-deficit disorder and other maladies." Instead of passing summer months hiking, swimming, and telling stories around the

campfire, children these days are more likely to attend computer camps or weight-loss camps. As a result, Louv says, they've come to think of nature as more of an abstraction than a reality.

May 16, 2007: Thirteenth Tale by Diane Setterfield "All children mythologize their birth..." So begins the prologue of reclusive author Vida Winter's collection of stories, which are as famous for the mystery of the missing thirteenth tale as they are for the delight and enchantment of the twelve that do exist.

Vida has spent six decades creating various outlandish life histories for herself, all inventions that have brought her fame and fortune but have kept her violent and tragic past a secret. Now old and ailing, she finally wants to tell the truth about her extraordinary life. She hires biographer Margaret Lea, a young woman for whom the secret of her own birth, hidden by those who loved her most, remains an ever-present pain.

Margaret is struck by the curious parallel between Miss Winter's story and her own, and takes on the job.

As Vida reveals the life she meant to bury for good, Margaret is mesmerized. It is a tale of gothic strangeness featuring the Angelfield family, including the beautiful and willful Isabelle, the feral twins Adeline and Emmeline, a ghost, a governess, a topiary garden and a devastating fire. Margaret succumbs to the power of Vida's storytelling but remains suspicious of the author's sincerity. She demands the truth from Vida, and together they confront the ghosts that have haunted them while becoming, finally, transformed by the truth themselves.

**June 20, 2007:** *Red Weather* by Pauls Toutonghi Communism is unraveling and nobody feels this unraveling more than Yuri Balodis, a fifteen-



year-old, first-generation American living with his Latvian-immigrant parents in Milwaukee's Third Ward. *Red Weather* is both funny and bittersweet, tinged with a rueful comic sense that will instantly remind you of the absurd

complications of love. Pauls Toutonghi's stunning debut novel is said to remind one of Michael Chabon's *The Mysteries of Pittsburgh* and Khaled Hosseini's *The Kite Runner*.

The 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Ledyard Sampler will take place at the Nathan Lester House on Saturday, June 19<sup>th</sup> Rain or shine. Activities will include

- Tours of the Lester House and Tool Museum,
- A refreshment stand
- Blacksmithing
- Spinning,
- Weaving,
- Hearth cooking
- Butter churning.

The Society for Creative Anachronism, Inc, a Medieval & Renaissance re-enactment group will demonstrate period fighting, and teach the public period dancing and board games, as well. An exhibit of live farm animals will also be on view.

We are looking for entertainers to provide historic-based entertainment, such as singers, storytellers, or musicians. Free spaces will be provided to non-profit & civic groups who aren't selling any items, but would like to publicize their causes, demonstrate a historic craft, or provide entertainment.

We are reserving 10' X 10' vendor spaces for crafters selling their wares, antique sellers, and the like for \$25 each. Craft demonstrators who would also like to sell their creations will pay only \$15 for a space. (There are a limited number of tables available for these spaces.)

#### Media Shelving at Bill Library

Bill Library has received new shelving to hold the audio and video collections. The shelving was placed in front of the reference desk to provide easy access for patrons



looking for videos, audio books, or CD's. One unit has pull out drawers which provide efficient storage of the items and better browsing capability. This unit holds the music and spoken CD and DVD collections. The other unit has traditional shelves and holds the audio books and some of the VHS video collections. This new shelving has allowed us to consolidate all of the non-print media in one location.

Funding for the shelving was made possible by the Friends of the Library, the Dime Savings Bank, and the Liberty Bank.

In order to accommodate this shelving, the card catalog was removed and replaced with two stand-up computer tables for the online catalog computers. These tables were funded by the Ledyard Rotary Club and the Friends of the Library. We are grateful to all of these organizations for their support.

#### **New Carpet at Gales Ferry Library**

Gales Ferry Library will be having new carpet installed this spring. Volunteers are being recruited to help pack books and/or to check out a box of books to take home during the installation. If you are willing to help pack books contact Mary Ellen at Gales Ferry Library to let her know.

#### Ramp and Windows for Bill Library

There are two building maintenance projects involving the ramp and windows scheduled to be done at Bill Library this spring. The existing ramp and stairs will be removed and replaced with a new ramp and stairs that will meet the ADA code. During construction the front door at the North entrance (on the green) will be used with a temporary ramp.

We will also have ten windows at Bill Library replaced with new energy efficient windows and frames. These include the 4 windows in the Historical room and 6 in the staff work area. We anticipate replacing all of the windows in the near future which will provide us with a more energy efficient building.
