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7th Annual One Book One Region

Living to 100 is rare enough, but learning to read at age 98 and then becoming the co-author of a book at 101 is incredible! One man did just that, and *Life Is So Good*, the book that George Dawson co-wrote with Richard Glaubman is a memoir of this full and incredible life and the choice for this year's One Book, One Region (OBOR).

The seventh season for OBOR still has the same goals: to bring people together to discuss ideas, to broaden the appreciation of reading, and to break down barriers among people in the community.

Life Is So Good is also about the sense that life is good, and that it only keeps getting better. While some of the experiences that George Dawson had in life were gruesome and difficult, he kept a positive attitude, and kept learning and observing about life for 103 years. What does it mean to have lived to 100? This book begs answers to that question. What will you have experienced? What will you have done for work, done to laugh, wanted to learn? What does it mean to be literate? What does it mean to be literate?

Throughout the summer and into September, high school students and adults in Southeastern Connecticut will be reading this book, attending movies and library programs, discussing the book with Susan Topping from Three Rivers Community College, and meeting the second author Richard Glaubman. Children's Summer Reading



at the library this summer! We have a great summer reading program for ages 4 and up. Registration begins Wednesday, June 18th at Bill or Gales **Ferry Library.** Please register at the library where the event is being offered. All programs are free and open to the public.

Read to Me! June 23 – August 2

Children turning 4 years old in 2008 up through entering 1st grade may register for this program and will receive a coloring sheet with 10 pictures. For each book the child reads independently (or has read to them) color in one picture and write the title on the back of the sheet. When 10 books have been read return the sheet to the library for a prize. Continue reading and after completing 5 sheets win a paperback book. Last date to return Read to me sheets is August 2nd!

Creepy Crawly Critter Game June 23 – August 2 Students entering grades 2-6

Test your memory and find the match to earn letters that will complete a sentence. Some matches will award a prize or activity sheet. Begin by reading for at least one hour starting June 14th. Keep track of the time you spend reading and then anytime after June 23rd come to the library for a game sheet. Children entering $2^{nd} - 3^{rd}$ grade will get one turn for each 30 minutes they read. Those entering $4^{th} - 6^{th}$ grades will get a turn for every 60 minutes they read.



Participants are encouraged to read at least one book that has something to do with bugs! Each elementary school has been given a challenge that will result in feeding Mrs. Brewer a bug by the student who reads the most minutes!

The last date to play is August 2nd!

Summer Travel Game June 23 – August 23 Students entering grades 2 -6

If you are going to be traveling this summer and won't be able to make it into the library as much as you would like, we have a "Travel Game" to take along. Register for your activity booklet, ask a parent or adult to sign off when an activity is completed, and return your booklet to the library by August 23rd for a prize. Be sure to list the titles of all the books you read on the back of the booklet.

Bug your Parents to Read!

Literacy experts say that parents who model silent reading for enjoyment play a huge role in the encouragement of reading for pleasure in their children! As part of the Children's and YA Summer Reading Programs and in conjunction with Ledyard Libraries focus on literacy and lifelong learning as themes for One Book One Region, we encourage all families to include reading as a family activity this summer. For every hour that a parent and child/children read at the same time (reading may be done in 15 minute increments) they may fill out a "Bug Your Parents to Read" raffle slip in the family name. At the end of the summer programs (August 2nd) we will draw 5 family names from each library to receive family activity prizes. June 18, 2008 - *The Abstinence Teacher* by Tom Perrotta


With abstinence programs and disputes over what can be taught in schools regularly making the front page, *The Abstinence Teacher* hits on prominent social fault lines. This has become something of a hallmark for Mr. Perrotta, who has developed a knack for combining hot-button cultural themes (electoral corruption in *Election*, mommy-and-me despair and vigilante justice in *Little Children*) with flawed and complicated characters. While his stories bear the sheen of satire, they are actually sharp though compassionate investigations of human relationships. They can also be very funny. (New York Times 10/14/2007)

July 16, 2008 - Mr. Pip by Lloyd Jones

On an island called Bougainville in the early 1990s, civil war rages. Rebels have taken up arms, and soldiers helicopter in from nearby Port Moresby to reestablish New Guinea's sovereignty over the island. All the whites have fled except one: Mr. Watts, a New Zealander married to a local woman. He offers to replace the departed teacher and reopen the village school. On the second day of class, he begins to read *Great Expectations* aloud. Suddenly, the village's children have a refuge from the incomprehensible conflict engulfing their world. "We could escape to another place," declares Matilda, the 13-year-old narrator. "It didn't matter that it was Victorian England. We found we could easily get there."


August 20, 2008- *Life is so Good* by Richard Glaubman and George Dawson

Movies Wednesday, June 25 "Nightjohn"

7:00 p.m.

Sarny, a twelve-year-old slave girl learns to read and uses her knowledge to expose and undermine the plantation power structure. Although "Nightjohn" has a strong pro-education message, it is conveyed with plenty of suspenseful drama and a bare minimum of preachiness. (PG-13) (92 mins.)

Wednesday, July 2 7:00 p.m. "There Was Always Sun Shining Someplace"

This documentary features interviews with baseball Hall of Famers, Satchel Paige, James 'Cool Papa' Bell, Buck Leonard, Judy Johnson, Monte Irvin, and Ray Dandridge. The exploits of these talented athletes and the times when baseball was a segregated sport are vividly brought to life. This movie contains rare historical footage showing the ballplayers as they traveled the back roads of America, The Caribbean, Mexico, and Latin America. (NR) (58 mins)

Wednesday, July 30 "Resting Place"

7:00 p.m.

This film is about Southern small town prejudice and military procedures. The screenplay is based on a true newspaper accounting of the difficulties involved when a Black American veteran died and his parents attempted to provide an honorable burial. (PG-13) (100 mins)

Tuesday, August 5 "Pride of Jesse Hallam"

7:00 p.m.

Some estimate that there are 25 million functional illiterates in the United States, and this film is purportedly based upon events in the life of one of them. Jesse Hallam, portrayed here by Johnny Cash, is primarily about Hallam's troubles after moving to a large city (Cincinnati). Hallam, a miner since the age of 14 from the Coal Fields of Western Kentucky, sells his country home to pay for his young

daughter's spinal surgery in the Ohio metropolis. He pits his native intelligence and work ethic against the problem of not being able to read or write to become literate. Scenes involving the methods used in developing his new skills are the most engrossing of the production. (1981- NR) (90 mins.)

Special Events Wednesday, August 6 7:00 p.m. Life Long Learning

Representatives from the Boston based Elderhostel and Adventures in Lifelong Learning of Norwich, CT will discuss their organizations activities. These two related not-for-profit organizations provide learning adventures to adults aged 55 and over. They believe learning is a lifelong pursuit that opens minds and enriches lives. Participants come from every walk of life to learn together, to exchange ideas, and to explore the world.

Wednesday, August 13 Literacy Volunteers of Eastern Connecticut

Susan Townsley, Executive Director of LVEC located in New London will speak about Literacy in this county of Connecticut and how volunteers are trained to teach English as a Second Language as well as reading and writing in English for those in need.

Stitch and Dish

The knitting group continues to meet twice a month at the Gales Ferry Library. Stitch and Dish is a social and instructive knitting group for all levels of ability. The only requirement is that you bring needles and yarn. Members will help new people get started or share patterns and yarn ideas. The evening group meets on the second Wednesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. and the afternoon group meets on the fourth Wednesday at 3:00 p.m. Both groups are held on a drop-in basis, so stop in for either one when you are looking for knitting buddies.

These items can be any size (up to 24 months) or color – but should be made of machine-washable yarns (especially the bibs!!) –and dropped off at the Bill or Gales Ferry Library. At the end of August, we will donate the baby clothes to the Navy's "baby sea bag" program and various outreach programs for babies and new mothers.
