Children's Summer Reading

One World, Many Stories It's One World Many Stories @ your library this summer! We have a great summer reading program for ages 4 and up.
Registration begins Tuesday, June 21st at Bill or Gales Ferry Library. Please register at the library where each individual program is being offered. All programs are free and open to the public.

Read to Me! June 27 – August 13 Children age 4 (in 2011) through entering 1st grade

Participants will receive a coloring sheet with 10 pictures. For each book read independently (or read to them) color in one picture and write the title on the back of the sheet. After all 10 pictures are colored and every title recorded, return the sheet to the library where the child is registered for a prize. Continue reading and after completing 5 sheets win a paperback book. The last day to return the sheets is August 13th.

One World, Many Stories! June 27 – August 13 Entering grades 2-6

The library plans to help needy families around the world by purchasing animals through Heifer International and you can help. For each hour spent reading, earn a



plastic coin to put in a jar representing the animal you would like us to purchase. Start reading on June 21 and record your time on the pamphlet handed out in school. If you do not attend Ledyard Public Schools you may pick up a pamphlet at either library. Return the pamphlet to the library anytime after June 26th, register for the program and get your "Passport" booklet which is filled with weekly activities to do over the summer. August 17: Extremely Loud and Incredibly Close

by Jonathan Safran Foer. This One Book One Region Book Discussion title will feature guest book discussion leader Susan Topping, Professor of Humanities, Three Rivers Community College. Meet Oskar Schell, an inventor, Francophile,



tambourine player, Shakespearean actor, jeweler, pacifist. He is nine years old. And he is on an urgent, secret search through the five boroughs of New York. His mission is to find the lock that fits a mysterious key belonging to his father, who died in the attack on the World Trade Center. An inspired creation, Oskar is alternately endearing, exasperating, and hilarious as he careens from Central Park to Coney Island to Harlem on his search. Along the way he is always dreaming up inventions to keep those he loves safe from harm. As Oskar roams New York, he encounters a motley assortment of characters who are all survivors in their own way. Extremely Loud and Incredibly Close boldly approaches history and tragedy with humor, tenderness, and awe.

September 21: *Room* by Emma Donoghue Five-year-old Jack and his Ma live and eat and play and sleep in one room--an 11×11 -foot space that is their prison--captives of the terrifying man Jack calls Old Nick. But as Jack grows older and more curious, it becomes clear that the room will not be able to hold him and Ma forever. Worried about his curiosity and her own desperation, his mother reveals to Jack that the Outside is real and that they must escape. She tells him that she was kidnapped by Old Nick and has been held secluded in the room for seven years. Jack is brave enough to carry out their plan, and the two of them are compelled to adjust to life "outside," with its bright lights and noise and people touching. What is reconnection for his mother is discovery for Jack,

who is soon overwhelmed by the changes in his mother and a world coming at him fast and furiously. (Booklist review.)

Author Todd Gipstein Legacy of the Light -A Connecticut Author Trail Event Wednesday, July 20 7 pm **Bill Library**

Join us for a lively presentation with Todd Gipstein discussing his new novel. Legacy of the Light is a historical thriller about two generations of lighthouse keepers at Race Rock Lighthouse off the shore of New London, Connecticut. "Legacy" is a story of how the past influences the



present, of fathers and sons, failure, guilt, love, and redemption. The story begins in 1907 and continues in 1938, when the hurricane of the century bears down on this man-made island in the middle of the sea. Those trapped at Race Rock – the keeper, his fiancée, and a mysterious stranger – must fight the forces of nature and the demons within that threaten to destroy them. *Legacy of the Light* draws readers into a fast-paced story full of twists and turns.

Todd Gipstein has been working as a photographer, writer, producer and lecturer for almost 40 years. He studied writing and film at Harvard University, where he graduated with honors in 1974. After working for Time-Life Multi-Media in New York, he started Gipstein Multi-Media in Boston in 1975. There he created numerous multiimage shows for museums and corporate clients. His writing included scripts, magazine articles and columns. He also travelled extensively as a photographer.

In 1989, he moved to Washington, D.C. to work full-time as the Director of Multi-Image / Executive Producer for the National Geographic Society. His work for National Geographic included writing and producing shows about geography, history, nature, cultures, photography, environmental issues and the Geographic. His work provided him opportunities for travels around the world as a photographer and lecturer. He also worked with Vice-President Al Gore on media related to environmental issues.

The 'Exquisite' Project Planning SessionTuesday, August 167 pmBill Library

We are trying an experiment in art and writing based on *The Exquisite Book* by Julia Rothman, Jenny Volvovski & Matt Lamothe. The final project



will be featured in the Artists & Writer's Showcase at the Bill Library next April. The first person creates a work (visual art or written work) based on a

(visual art or written work) based on a theme, and then passes it on to the second person. The second person will then create a work that connects to the previous one in some way. Then, their work is passed on to the

next person, and so on. The catch is you only get to see the work of the person immediately before you, until the project is revealed at the opening reception. The works will be displayed consecutively, so the viewer may see the "story" as it unfolded. This is a form of the classic 'Exquisite Corpse' game. Writers will be contributing to a poem or short story. Visual artists will be creating works that contain a certain visual element. We will begin organizing in August, so sign up to find out more! The Gales Ferry Library Book sale was held June 8-18. Carl Nelson was the Chairman and put in




