Book Discussions

Join our monthly book discussions on Wednesday evenings at Bill Library, beginning at 7 P.M. We always welcome new participants and provide evening refreshments.

January 18, 2006: Bring in your favorite titles read over the last two months. Many members of the book discussion group look forward to this event when we share the best of our reads from over the holidays. The seasonal rush is over, and the long winter nights are here when you can curl up with what others have found rewarding or fascinating. Come with a list of what you've read and leave space on your book shelves for those you'll need to remember to read.

February 15, 2006: A Confederacy of Dunces by John Kennedy Toole - In conjunction with the Winter Reading program. Published 10 years after the author's death, this book won the 1981 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction. John Kennedy Toole's hero is one, "huge, obese, fractious, fastidious, a latter-day Gargantua, a Don Quixote of the French Quarter. His story bursts with wholly original characters, denizens of New Orleans' lower depths, incredibly true-to-life dialogue, and the zaniest series of high and low comic adventures" (Henry Kisor, Chicago Sun-Times). Ignatius J. Reilly is a flatulent frustrated scholar deeply learned in medieval philosophy and American junk food, a brainy mammoth misfit imprisoned in a trashy world of Greyhound Buses and Doris Day movies. He is in violent revolt against the entire modern age.

March 15, 2006: Wild Life by Molly Gloss. It is the early 1900s and Charlotte Bridger
Drummond is a thoroughly modern woman. The sole provider for her five young boys, Charlotte is a fiercely independent, freethinking woman of the West who fully embraces the scientific spirit that is sweeping the nation at the dawn of the industrial age. Thumbing her nose at convention,

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she dresses in men's clothes, avoids housework whenever possible, and proudly supports her family by writing popular women's adventure stories. Ready to show off her knowledge of the local flora and fauna and have an adventure of her own, Charlotte joins a search party for a child who has disappeared in the deep wood wilderness on the border between Oregon and Washington. But when she gets lost herself, she is thrust into a mysterious world that not only tests her courage, but also challenges her entire concept of reality.

April 19, 2006: The Shadow of the Wind by Carlos Ruiz Zafón. This story provokes such thoughts because it is a long novel that will remind readers of a good many other novels. This isn't meant as criticism but as an indication of the story's richness and architectonic intricacy. Before everything else, Carlos Ruiz Zafón's European bestseller is a book about a mysterious book, and its even more mysterious author. Try to imagine a blend of Grand Guignol thriller, historical fiction, occasional farce, existential mystery and passionate love story; then double it. If that's too hard to do, let me put it another way: If you love A.S. Byatt's Possession, García Márquez's One Hundred Years of Solitude, the short stories of Borges, Umberto Eco's The Name of the Rose, Arturo Pérez-Reverte's The Club Dumas or Paul Auster's "New York" trilogy, not to mention Victor Hugo's Hunchback of Notre Dame and William Hjortsberg's Falling Angel, then you will love The Shadow of the Wind. Family Fitness Fun @ your Library



The family fitness fun series continues this winter with monthly hikes at various locations in town co-sponsored by Ledyard Library Friends and the Ledyard Conservation Commission. We invite you to do something fun with your family this

winter and join us as we enjoy the outdoors and learn about wildlife, letterboxing, and glaciers. Please note that some of these hikes are more strenuous than others. Children must be accompanied by an adult. Parking is limited at Whitehall Park and Avery Preserve so we suggest meeting at Bill Library for the first two hikes and carpooling to the trail head. Be sure to dress warm. Call either library to sign up for one or more of these hikes.

Saturday, January 28 Wildlife in winter White Hall Park and Forest 1:00 p.m. (Meet at Bill Library)

Bob DeWire from Naturescapes will join us on this hike and talk about animal and plant life in winter. The trail is located on the East Side of Shewville Road and consists of rocky uplands, fields



and two ponds as well as open field areas.

Saturday, February 25 Avery Preserve (Meet at Bill Library)

Join us for a winter walk through this preserve which offers woodlands, brook, glacial boulder deposits, and the Avery sheep wash. The trail head is

located on Avery Hill Road. Feel free to wear your snowshoes if there is snow on the ground.

Saturday, March 25 Letterboxing Nathan Lester House Trails 1:00 p.m.

Scott Buka will lead us through the trails on the grounds of Nathan Lester House for a letterboxing hike. Letterboxing combines hiking with a treasure hunt and is a great way to enjoy a walk in the woods! The object is to find the hidden box which contains a notebook with comments from previous hikers and a stamp. Rudimentary letterboxing kits will be available the day of the hike, or you are encouraged to assemble your own! All you need is a rubber stamp of your choice, (which some people carve from an art eraser), or a token, a stamp pad, a notebook and writing implement. Use the stamp in the box on your notebook and add your stamp or token with your comments to the notebook in the box. For more information about letterboxing, logon to www.letterboxing.org. Park in the lot on the entrance road to the Lester House, and meet at the front of the House.

Saturday, April 22 Glacial Park

Glacial History 1: 00 p.m.

Doug Thompson, a Geology professor at Connecticut College will lead hikers through Glacier Park and describe the glacial history of the area. The hike will begin at the Recessional Moraine site on Whalehead Road. Hikers will have the option of continuing to the Kettlehole trail on Avery Hill

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Extension. Ledyard has a Boulder train and several kettleholes left by the Wisconsin glacier 12,000 years ago. The "moraine consists of huge boulders tumbled 3 or 4 deep in places, and extending for several miles." **Note:** The main trail requires scrambling over rocks and boulders and may not be within the capability of all hikers. An alternate trail follows the edge of the boulder moraine with side trips in to view and explore the boulders.

Health Series

Ledyard Libraries will sponsor a series of health lectures at Bill Library this winter with Leon S. Harris, DAc. Dr. Harris is certified as a Diplomat of Acupuncture and Chinese Herbology by the National



Certification Commission for Acupuncture and Oriental Medicine (NCCAOM) and is currently licensed to practice in Connecticut and Rhode Island. He currently practices in Gales Ferry with Dr. Robert Barnett at the Holistic Health Center where they provide safe and drug-free alternatives to their patient's health issues.
