

Book Discussions




Join our monthly book discussions on Wednesday evenings at Bill Library, beginning at 7 P.M. We always welcome new participants and provide evening refreshments.

January 17, 2006 Please come and bring your favorite reads from the past few months to share and discuss with other members. This is an annual event where many of us have learned to come with paper and pen to create long lists of future reads for ourselves. This is truly one of our most popular evenings of the year as we get to hear of many new books, and book discussion members are usually very enthusiastic about what they've read!

February 21, 2006: *Year of Wonders* by Geraldine Brooks. This book describes the 17th-century plague that is carried from London to a small Derbyshire village by an itinerant tailor. As villagers begin, one by one, to die, the rest face a choice: do they flee their village in hope of outrunning the plague or do they stay? The lord of the manor and his family pack up and leave. The rector, Michael Mompellion, argues forcefully that the villagers should stay put, isolate themselves from neighboring towns and villages, and prevent the contagion from spreading. His oratory wins the day and the village turns in on itself. Cocooned from the outside world and ravaged by the disease, its inhabitants struggle to retain their humanity in the face of the disaster. March 21, 2006: I, Mona Lisa by Jeanne



Kalogridis. Set against a backdrop of political and religious conflicts in 15th-century Medici-ruled Florence, Kalogridis's work of historical fiction identifies the subject of Leonardo da Vinci's painting as Lisa di Antonio Gherardini. Lisa was the daughter of Madonna Lucrezia, wife of a wealthy

wool merchant who also enchanted both da Vinci and Lorenzo de' Medici's brother Giuliano, murdered by conspirators in 1478. Giuliano's assassination—and the later murder of sLucrezia—presage a reign of religious terror led by a monk known as Savonarola and the retreat of the Medicis in the face of invasion from France's King Charles. As an adult Lisa attracts the romantic attentions of a young Medici scion, whom she marries for love. (His father, Lorenzo, commissions her portrait from da Vinci.) But violent events soon separate the couple and a brutal Savonarola follower tells Lisa that her husband is dead—and her father's life is in danger—unless she marries him instead.

April 18, 2006: Last Child in the Woods:

Saving Our Children from NatureDeficit Disorder by Richard Louv.

Today's kids are increasingly
disconnected from the natural world,
says child advocacy expert Richard
Louv, even as research shows that
"thoughtful exposure of youngsters to
nature can... be a powerful form of therapy for
attention-deficit disorder and other maladies."
Instead of passing summer months hiking,
swimming and telling stories around the

campfire, children these days are more likely to attend computer camps or weight-loss camps: as a result, Louv says, they've come to think of nature as more of an abstraction than a reality. Louv's book is a call to action, full of warnings—but also full of ideas for change. (from Publisher's Weekly) (In conjunction with the Monthly Hikes Program)

Saturday, January 13 1:00 p.m. Avalonia Land Conservancy's Pine Swamp Wildlife Corridor; Harry Leiser Tract and Nathan Lester Park (Park at the Nathan Lester House)

This hike will begin and end at the Nathan Lester House. Maggie Jones from the Denison Pequotsepos Nature Center will lead us along the trail in the Harry Leiser Tract and through some of the trails at Nathan Lester Park. Native giant rhododendrons and towering tulip poplars are among the treasures to encounter on the Leiser tract. The wooded trails surrounding the Nathan Lester House feature wetlands, a small pond and an abundance of wildlife. Complete your adventure with hot chocolate at the Nathan Lester House.

Sunday, February 4 1:00 p.m. Pine Swamp Wildlife Corridor (PSWC); Slosberg-Andersen Woodlands/Dow Centennial Preserve

Anne Roberts-Pierson will lead this hike which is co-sponsored by the Avalonia Land Conservancy. Hikers will meet at the Hillside Drive Trailhead at the end of the cul de sac. (Directions: Take Christy Hill Road from Rte 12

to Oakwood Dr. Go left on Oakwood Dr., right on East Dr., then left onto Hillside Dr. and go to the end.) The hike will start from Hillside Drive trailhead, skirt the Pine Swamp, and continue on to circle around the Dow Centennial Preserve, ultimately returning to the starting point. This will be a long hike as there is much to discover over varied terrain. Anticipate discussion about local water supplies, the Ice Age, and more!

Saturday, March 10 1:00 p.m. Burton Property, Town of Ledyard

Andy Jensen will lead this hike which is co-sponsored by the Ledyard Conservation
Commission, through the Burton
Property. We will meet at the parking lot behind the high school on Gallup Hill Rd. This property contains a very historic local site as well as providing habitat for a bird with a very unusual springtime courtship ritual!

Saturday, April 14 1:00 p.m. Signs of Spring The Nature Conservancy's Poquetanuck Cove Preserve



Beth Sullivan will lead us through this diverse Nature Conservancy preserve that borders Poquetanuck Cove. We will look for signs of spring as we travel through a hardwood forest and hemlock ravine containing a stream to the cove itself and around the loop back through the forest. Entrance to the preserve is on the west side of Avery Hill Rd. Parking is limited and carpooling is encouraged.
