December 17, 2008: No Book Discussion - Happy Holidays

January 21, 2009: Best Books Read over the Holiday Season. Please come and bring your favorite reads from the past few months to share and discuss with other members. This is an annual event where many of us have learned to come with paper and pen to create long lists of future reads for ourselves. This is truly one of our most popular evenings of the year as we get to hear of many new books, and book discussion members are usually very enthusiastic about what they've read!

February 18, 2009: *Dirty Water* by Mary-Ann Tirone Smith and Jere Smith
What is a baby, lightly drugged but otherwise healthy, doing abandoned in the players' chapel at

Boston's Fenway Park? Meanwhile, the girlfriend of a player on the Red Sox's Portland, Maine, farm team is found beaten and drowned in Boston. Rocky Patel, a Boston PD homicide detective, catches both cases and quickly pieces together the connections between the two. But as good as Patel is, there's a blogger out there who always seems just a half step ahead of him and ultimately may be critical to solving the case. Baseball fans (citizens of Red Sox Nation in particular) will enjoy this one thoroughly. The authors use real players as characters and incorporate the best aspects of their public personas into the story. The plot unfolds intelligently, and Rocky Patel is a good guide through the proceedings. A solid contribution to the growing subgenre of baseball mysteries. (*Booklist* review.)

March 18, 2009: *The Good Thief* by Hannah Tinti
This striking debut novel is a homage to old-fashioned boys-own adventure stories, and unfolds like a Robert Louis Stevenson tale retold amid the hardscrabble squalor of Colonial New England. The sheer strangeness of the story is beguiling: A one-handed boy, tainted by his upbringing in a Catholic orphanage and with little to offer but a head full of lice, is adopted by a con artist, and enters an underworld of ruthless mousetrap-manufacturing barons, feisty chimney-dwelling dwarves, and, perhaps most terrifying of all, black-market dentists. In keeping with the gothic tradition, Tinti writes with an arch, almost camp sensibility. While on a nocturnal grave-digging excursion to procure bodies for a crazy scientist, for instance, the pair encounters an assassin, who tells the twelve-year-old hero that he was made for killing. Will the boy ever discover the truth of his past? Its good fun watching him find out. (*New Yorker* review.)

The library was recently awarded a grant from the Dime Savings Bank Foundation to help with a restoration project in the Janice Bell Local History Room. The funds will be used to digitize and restore the photos and replace the originals in the frames with the digitized image. The originals will then be stored to prevent further deterioration. We are awaiting word on a second grant that will pay to clean and repair the original frames.
