LION Announces Supplemental Delivery Services For Member Libraries

Ledyard Library patrons will now have better access to materials from other LION libraries thanks to our membership in the LION consortium. The Board of Trustees of Libraries Online, Inc., (LION) has contracted with Riverbend Express of Portland, CT, to provide supplemental delivery services among member libraries. Its purpose is to enhance the consortium's resource sharing capabilities. The service begins on Monday, September 18, 2017.

Patrons of LION member libraries have made extensive use of deliverIT CT, the statewide library courier service, since its inception in 1974. Recent cuts to the service, the result of reductions in the state library budget, have forced libraries to place restrictions on the number of items that can be requested from libraries elsewhere, and this decline in access has concerned borrowers and librarians alike.

LION responded by seeking out a courier who would handle LION-only traffic. This means that, effective September 18, 2017, Ledyard patrons will no longer be restricted in the number of items they wish to borrow from other libraries. Items from non-LION libraries will continue to be distributed by deliverIT CT.

Libraries Online, Inc. (LION) is a not-for-profit 501(c)(3) organization formed by its members in 1982. Our 28 libraries share an Integrated Library System and other services from the Middletown office. Public and academic member libraries in south-central Connecticut use the system to service their 234,000 patrons with 830,000 shared unique titles linked to over two and one half million items in their local collections. LION is governed by a Board of Directors comprised of a designated representative from each member library.

Summer Wrap up



We had a great program with "Build a Better World" this summer. There were 117 players in the older program (grades 2-6) and 60 players in the Read to Me program (ages 4 – grade 1) for a total of 177 children who

participated at both Bill and Gales Ferry Libraries. The older children read 141,139 minutes and the younger children read 2,490 books! In addition to the reading programs, we had a Sidewalk Chalk Contest, Preschool Storytime, Lunch and a Movie, Engineering crafts, Lego makers, Touch-a-Truck, Kids Cook, Chris Merwin Music, and a fantastic magical performance with Christine LaVaughn.

Teen Summer Reading Program 2017

We had a busy summer this year with lots of programs for teens. We had 38 teens signed up for our program this year. There were 134 read books



recorded, and 167 volunteer shifts worked. We provided programs in Ductigami, 2 Movie nights, Teens Cook, and an Ice Cream Party to finish up the summer

Prizes were awarded each week of the program to 28 winners. The prizes included Duct tape, Paddleballs & noodles, Movie basket, candy,

Boogie Boards, Cooler and cup, Subway gift cards and various gift certificates.

Congratulations to all of our readers and volunteers with extra kudos to Emily Dunsmore for the most books read (17) and Megan Uhlig and Benjamin Fieldsend who tied for the most volunteer shifts (17 each).

Click the link for the book title to see information about the book. These discussions are open to the public and all participants are welcome.

October: Days Without End by Sebastian Barry Read about America's war of extinction against Native Americans, as well as the chaos and terrible toll taken by young soldiers in the Civil War. This is the third book nominated for a Mann Booker Award from this author.

November: Autumn by Ali Smith

A long platonic friendship between an elderly man and a much younger woman is explored in this novel. His name is Daniel. He's 101.... Her name is Elisabeth. She's a 32-year-old fitfully employed art lecturer at an unnamed university in London. She comes to read to, and be with, him. As Elisabeth and Daniel talk, and as Elisabeth processes the events of her life, a world opens.

December: Before Everything by Victoria Redel This novel is a celebration of friendship and love between a group of women who have known each another since they were girls. They've faced everything together, from youthful sprees and scrapes to mid-life turning points. Now, as Anna, the group's trailblazer and brightest spark, enters hospice, they gather to do what they've always done—talk and laugh and help each other make choices and plans, this time in Anna's rural Massachusetts home.

The Search for Ezra Chamberlin and the Confederate Submarine H.L. Hunley Monday, September 25 Bill Library

The Friends of Ledyard Libraries are pleased to welcome Mr. Nicholas Bellantoni, Emeritus Connecticut State Archaeologist talking about the confederate

submarine H.L. Hunley. In 2000 it was raised from the depths of Charleston Harbor and seen for the first time in 136 years. An archaeological investigation of the Hunley's interior yielded a surprising item: the ID tag of Ezra Chamberlin, a Union soldier from Killingly, Connecticut. Did this Connecticut Yankee die on a Confederate submarine? While telling the story of the Hunley, state archaeologist Nicholas Bellantoni searches for the fate of Ezra Chamberlin.

Library Staff member Laverne Stokes Retiring

Maker Day



We held our first Maker Day at the Bill Library Sat., July 22' on the lawn and in the meeting room. Approximately 100 people observed makers at work and participated in maker activities.

Outside, participants watched blacksmiths Brian Dimmock and Scott Weeks, scrimshaw and fine artist Shawn Coffing, upcycling artist and tinkerer Wanda DeCoteau, woodcarver Ben Anderson, and the Sheep to Shawl exhibit hosted by the Finlayson family. Demonstrating medieval technology, such as making chain mail, embroidery, drop spinning, and other arts, were representatives of the local chapter of the Society for Creative Anachronism, a medieval and renaissance re-creation group, led by their Chatelaine, Lisa Stevens.

Library sponsored activities included tables where one could find out about the Friends of Ledyard Libraries' projects and color bookmarks, learn about yarnbombing and our twice-monthly knitting group, create sidewalk art, learn to weave, fold origami or make a paper windsock, make custom buttons, learn engineering principals with marshmallows and toothpicks, and build with Legos. Also on exhibit was the digital sundial printed on our very own 3D printer by Dwight Snowberger.

Inside the library, people visited the Formlabs 3D Printing table hosted by Nate Bradbury, David Anderson's robotics and Arduino display, and the Snowberger family's table where they showed a sumo robot, chain mail projects from a recent maker

meet-up, and demonstrated the library's 3D printer. A sewing demonstration was held by Spark Makerspace, based in New London.

My heartfelt thanks go to all the makers who shared their talents and time with us, and the library staff and Friends volunteers who helped me with the planning, set up, and break down. These include Harry & Michelle Pearson, Catherine Hiller, Jennifer Eastborne, Doug Moffat, Rebecca Graebner, Dwight Snowberger, Nancy Brewer, Jackie Bacon, and teen volunteer Katie Rezendes. There was also a lovely couple who helped us set up, and two other teens whose names I sadly did not get to write down. A big thank you also goes to the Ledyard Lions, who very kindly loaned us a dozen of their tables for the day, and were very helpful in the loading and unloading process.

This event was a demonstration of the creative and cooperative community in which we live, and one that I am proud to be a part of. I look forward to more exciting maker activities with you all.
