addition to <u>researchITCT</u>, one of the great online resources available to all Connecticut residents in collaboration with Connecticut Public Libraries!

The Learning Express offers many features, which patrons will find useful and practical for meeting their education and career goals. A personal dashboard features six Centers including an Occupational Test Preparation area, a Job & Career Accelerator, a High School Equivalency and a Computer Skills areas. Within each area are modules that allow for self-paced learning and tracking of your progress in each area.

Two more centers are designed for Spanish learners with modules to improve math, reading, and writing skills, and finally the Workplace Success center, where soft skills, math, reading, writing, finance, and becoming a U.S. citizen modules are available.

CT State Library Preserving the Post. Informing the Future. has been awarded an American Rescue Plan Act Grant (ARPA) for

\$17,836. "This project is made possible in part by the Institute of Museum and Library Services under the provisions of the Library Services and Technology Act, administered by the Connecticut State Library."

This federally funded program was set up with three priorities in mind, to help libraries increase digital access within a community, provide a safe and healthy environment and assist with workforce development and telehealth. Library staff have identified items they feel will have the most impact on the Ledyard community. These include boosting the Wi-Fi signal further outside the buildings, privacy booths where patrons can conduct online job interviews, make a telehealth appointment or take an exam for an online class, a self checkout station that will allow patrons to have a contactless interaction, adding electric and USB power on the patio for patrons who like to work there with their devices and more. We hope to begin ordering and installing the items in early fall.

Looking for recommendations to read for the reading challenge? These titles, recommended by library staff, have an animal as the main character?


Elaine recommends:



Peacebunny Island: The Extraordinary Journey of a Boy and his Comfort Rabbits, and How They're Teaching Us about Hope and Kindness This nonfiction book is written by the now 16-year old Caleb Smith as he recounts starting his comfort rabbit business. As an elementary school child, Caleb convinces his parents to

help him create a rabbit education and fostering program. After seeing therapy dogs at work while volunteering in the aftermath of the Sandy Hook school shooting, he gets the idea of "comfort rabbits" and expands his program to bring his rabbits to funerals, detention centers, and places where people are recovering from trauma. You'll laugh and cry with Caleb, but the real stars of the book are the rabbits, whose unique personalities shine on every page. Lisa recommends :

Joint Custody by Lauren Baratz-Logsted and Jackie Logsted Told in the voice of Gatz, a smallish-22 lb. Border Collie, Gatz observes the exaltations and trials of love with a curious mind. Keenly aware of the relationship between the Man and the Woman, his two favorite humans, Gatz experiences a heart-wrenching



breakup. As the Woman moves out, Gatz desperately creates a plan to get his owners back together again by eating a 2-lb. box of chocolates. Contemplating his own death in the process, Gatz realizes it's not so easy to die when you don't really want to.

A romping, fun tale, Gatz learns love is anything but predictable! A unique, clever story for dog and animal lovers alike.
